A Message From Pastor Pat Getting to Know You

(feel free to sing along)

Whether you have been coming to church for ages or are relatively new, getting to know people isn't easy.

Coffee Hour provides time for chit chat, but it's not a great way to get to know people.

We want to change that. You are invited to join a small group! The purpose of the group is to get to know people in the church and build deeper community. Groups of 8-10 will gather in people's homes once a month for an initial commitment of six months. After that time members can decide if they want to continue.

Small group ministry is intentional, lay-led small groups that deepen and expand the ministry of a congregation. Two focal points are building community and providing an

opportunity for spiritual exploration and growth. Small group ministry is also called covenant group ministry because participants make an intentional commitment to each other to be present and participate.

Strong community and spiritual depth are two hallmarks of a healthy congregation. We all need companions in our faith journey and small group ministry provides that opportunity.

The small groups will form and convene after Easter. There is a sign -up sheet on the bulletin board between the offices. Once participants have signed up, groups will be assigned by Pastor Pat, a facilitator will be chosen from each group and Pastor Pat will train them.

This is an exciting opportunity to grow in your life of faith and build strong relationships with people from LCC. I hope to see YOUR name on the sign up sheet!




Lenten Study

From the Historian's Desk



Getting to Know our History, continued...

Last month we learned about the formation of the very long (north to south) Town of Groton in 1705. It wasn't long before those in the north part of town, nearer Preston, began to complain of the hardship of travelling all the way to the church in Groton. That meetinghouse was not where the current Groton Congregational Church is located, but somewhat farther north, "near the crossroads," which I have been told was in the Old Mystic area. That was still not close enough for the northern residents, and they had a point. Imagine driving your car from the Mohegan-Pequot Bridge across Ledyard and down Pumpkin Hill Road to 184. This takes you to that approximate area, and it is not a short trip. Now imagine doing that on horseback or in a farm wagon! Throw in some terrible, rutty roads. It's not surprising that they considered it a hardship.

At first, they negotiated with their own congregation, but there was resistance, perhaps due to the expected loss of revenue from a divided church. To pursue the issue,

they presented a petition to the Town of Groton in 1724...

"The petition of us Whose Names are underwritten being Inhabitants of ye north part of sd town, Humbly Showeth That whereas we find our Selves under Extreem difficultys to attend the publick Worship of God [] days: by Reason of our Greate distance from the Place opointed for Publick worship, & by Reason of Great difficulties in keeping a Sufficient number of horses for our families to attend the same – and Canot be attended in a Constant way soe that we find our selves & Children in very difficult Circumstances for want of the word Preached among us -Therefore wee Request that the Town would grant us the Liberty & Priviledge of being a distinct Parrish by our Selves; that we

may be making Provision to Call and Setle a minister amongst our Selves; that it may be well with us & our Children after us; Moreover wee also desire that a Cometee be Chosen to State & Setle a Line between ye south and ye north Society as the Town Shall think fit and yore Petitioners Shall Ever Pray &c."

The thirty-seven petitioners who signed below include many familiar names – Avery, Williams, Gere, Allyn, Spicer, Dean, Gallup, Morgan, Bill and others.

This petition was "negatived" by the town in September 1724, but they did not give up. Less than a year later, in May of 1725, they sent a new petition directly to the General Assembly. We'll hear about that effort next month.

Faith Formation and Sunday School



During March, our focus was on understanding the meaning of God as Love. It's a big theme, and we explored it in many different ways. If God is love, what color is love? Is love the color of the flowers, the clouds, the grass, or a sunset? If love is all of these colors, as one of our children told us, love is like a rainbow. Love includes all of us, and God loves us all. Moving into the Lenten Season, we focused on how we build our relationship with God. To do this, we turned to the Bible. The Bible holds the stories of the promises God made to us, and the many ways we can love God and love everyone. In the bible we learned that even Jesus was tempted to do the wrong thing. Through books we explored what happens when we do things without thinking them through, as we are all tempted to do. If we run a cart through the grocery store because it might be fun, we may collide with someone. And what would happen if everyone did that? What a mess! But, if we spread love--hugs, help, smile--well, what would happen if everyone did that.

As we continue to explore the themes of Lent, we will also learn more about the Bible. We want the children to have a 'hands-on'

experience of the bible, deepening their understanding of God's promise to us all, the many ways we can pray, and the many ways that children can spread God's love in the world. We will plant seeds for our children's garden, collect the language of love, and explore the ideas that children have for being helpers in the world.

Behind the Scenes in Sunday School

The Faith Formation Team meets monthly and provides guidance for the weekly planning that goes into Sunday School. The content of the Sunday School lessons follows an overarching theme, and connects to the Sunday scripture readings. The goal is to help children explore their personal relationship to God. The format may include:

- A Circle Gathering: introductions, sharing information, prayer and song
- Reading: a trade book or bible reading
- Activity: appropriate to the day's topic
- Closing: saying goodbye

Faith Formation meets the second Wednesday of every month at noon. Our next meeting is April 9th and all are welcome.

Hello, I'm Kristie Lindgren, your new childcare provider for Sunday worship. My family is new to the Congregation but we are so grateful to have received such a warm welcome from all of you. I look forward to helping in both the nursery room (ages 0-2) and the Sunday school room during Sunday Worship each week.

In addition to my experience caring for my own children and babysitting for other families, I have a master's degree in teaching and ten+ years of teaching experience working with children ranging from grades K-12 here in Connecticut.

We have worked to spruce up the tot/nursery room at the church and we are ready for business! We are accepting children ages 0-2 in the tot room during Sunday worship - please be sure to sign the paperwork before dropping your children off in the morning.

Paperwork will be presented to you for signature at time of drop off.

I invite you all to share in this rewarding experience interacting with the children of the members in our congregation. We are looking for volunteers to assist in the childcare room with me; we'd have a list and rotate through the names. It would be a once a month volunteer opportunity. You can follow along by listening to Pastor

Pat and the members upstairs through the sound system while you're in the crib room, so you won't miss the message or the beautiful music that accompanies worship. Accommodations can be made for volunteers (example: I volunteer to change any and all diapers! Haha) who may have limits or restrictions on what they can do physically. You do not necessarily need to lift, bend, or sit on the floor. There are comfy chairs for you to sit in while you assist with supervision. The church's safety policy states that the children are always supervised by a minimum of two adults at all times. Childcare providers will not be alone with the children. So your help is needed!

PS - we are also accepting donations of diapers and wipes, as well as baby items such as baby gates or playpens—please speak to Kristie or Dolly to learn more specifics on what we need. At this time we only need infant toys — we are all set with toys for ages 12—24 months!
