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O & A Statement

In 2011, our church adopted a resolution to be an "Open and Affirming" congregation. As part of our recent Conflict Resolution Workshop, a new O&A committee has been formed to review our current messaging and ways to be more inviting to our LGBTQIA+ community, including possibly revising our current O&A Statement. For background, especially for our newest members, here is our existing statement approved by the

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Congregation at the Annual Meeting on January 30, 2011:

"There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." [Galatians 3:28]

As we are one in Christ, we are called to accept and respect one another in the face of our differences. We commit ourselves to work diligently to end all oppression and discrimination which afflicts God's people in our society. We seek to explore new ways of affirming our faith in community according to the wisdom of the Gospel. We work, as individuals, to become more Christlike in our love for one another.

Because love is a unifying and strengthening force within our Christian faith, We, the members of the Ledyard Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, hereby declare ourselves an Open and Affirming Christian community, actively expressing Jesus' inclusive embrace of all people.

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We welcome all who seek to follow Jesus, including persons of every age, gender, race, national origin, faith background, marital status and family structure, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, mental and physical ability, economic and social status, and educational background, to share in the life, leadership, ministry, fellowship, worship, sacraments, responsibilities, blessings and joys of our church family.

We encourage all members to participate and share talents and energy in the worship and work of the congregation. By full participation we would include as examples the following:

- Full participation in the Rites and Sacraments of the Church;
- Service as teachers for Christian Education classes and leaders of vouth activities;
- Participation in all committees and service in all offices;
- Equal consideration for all employment opportunities.

Jesus teaches us to welcome all God's children into God's covenantal community. As we grow together in faith and love, we will strive to celebrate the diversity in which God has created us. As followers of Christ we seek by this affirmation to be faithful to his commandment, "love one another as I have loved you." [John 15:1].

Help Us Collect Items for Children Going to Camp HOPE America This Summer

We are collecting the items needed for eight children who will be going

to Camp HOPE
America this summer.
Camp HOPE America



is a week-long overnight camping program run by Safe Futures for the children in their programs. From their website, "Camp HOPE America is an evidence-based camping and mentoring program in the United States that focuses on children and teens exposed to domestic violence. The program aims to give youth a brighter future by fostering pathways to hope and healing. What sets Camp HOPE America apart is its trauma-informed approach, emphasizing the development of campers' character rather than their accomplishments. Each day, campers read about real people, not too much older than they are, who have overcome adversity, abuse, and other real-life challenges to show them that they are not alone, and that their past does not define their future. The program includes a week of overnight camp with various activities, such as field games, rock climbing, and art projects, designed to challenge campers to overcome fears and build resilience."

We have created tags which are hanging on the wall in Fellowship Hall, each listing a specific item needed. Please take a tag or two, shop for the item(s), and leave it in the one of the laundry basket which are in on the bench in the foyer

outside the offices **by Sunday, July 27th.**

All items need to be non-descript, no characters or special designs to insure children do not feel slighted by what others receive.

Camp HOPE America is just one of the many programs and resources Safe Futures provide to families and individuals affected by domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, and trafficking in southeastern Connecticut, including temporary housing.

FAQs on our New Alarm System

When I enter the building, why does the panel near the entry door beep at me?

Beeping at the panel warns you the zone you entered is armed. You have 30 seconds to disarm at the alarm panel before the alarm siren is triggered.

When I exit the building and re-arm the zone, why does the panel again beep?

Beeping now warns you the zone is armed. You have 60 seconds to exit. Opening the exit door after that will again trigger the alarm (after 30 seconds).

What's the difference between arming "away" and arming "stay"?

Arming away activates motion sensors as well as entry/exit doors, while arming stay excludes motion sensors. Stay mode is especially useful when you plan to be in the church alone for an extended period. Any visitor through an entry door will still need to disarm the system to prevent the siren from being triggered.

Why is the siren immediately activated when I enter another zone through an interior door?

If you enter an armed zone from an interior door, active motion sensors will immediately trigger the alarm siren.

Can I disarm multiple zones from a single panel?

You can arm or disarm multiple (or all) zones from a single panel by entering the associated zone number(s). For example, to disarm zones 1, 2, and 3 simultaneously at the panel, enter your 4-digit PIN, then 1 (for OFF), then 123 (for all three zones), then press the star key (*).

Is there an easier way?

An easier way to arm/disarm is by using the Total Connect app on your smart phone. If you haven't added this to your phone, ask Rob Burns to help set you up.

Also, there's a shortcut for arming a single zone only at the panel: just enter the number key (#), then 2 to arm away or #3 to arm in stay mode.

Thank you to all who participated in the fire drill held on May 18, and to those who provided feedback. Your cooperation is appreciated. The feedback given will help us improve upon our evacuation plan.

In addition to organizing the fire drill, some of the other ways the Safe Church Committee has been working to keep our church safe include:

- Posting emergency phone numbers next to each of the fire pull alarms.
- Organizing a fire extinguisher demonstration after church on May 4th. Approximately 12 people attended. Thank you, Brian Johnson, for the demo and all the information provided.
- Creating Exit Plan maps with the route indicated to exit the building. These are posted in Fellowship Hall, Lester Room, Music Room, Library, Pastor's Office, Administrative Coordinator's Office, Crib Room, Social Hall, and the Sanctuary.
- Clearing out storage areas of any unnecessary items.

Faith Formation and Sunday School

Our Whole Lives (OWL)

Last May, many of us attended the workshop offered by Reverend Melissa Spindler Smith. It was an introduction to the Our Whole Lives, a lifetime sexual education program designed collaboratively by United Church of Christ and Unitarian Universalist Association. The workshop was remarkable in that Reverend Spindler Smith spoke about the spirituality of our sexual identities in words that were matter -of-fact, and stripped of any elements of shame or blame. We learned that biological identification of sex isn't always clear at birth, as not all newborns fully display their genitalia. We learned about the conflict between one's internal sense of gender and societal norms as individuals grapple with their gender identity. We learned about fluidity, as not everyone experiences themselves as one gender or the other. We learned that societal norms don't make it safe for LBTQ+ to be their god given selves. We learned about the importance of allowing individuals to name their

identities and to have those identities accepted and affirmed.

The UCC offers a collection of videos, Our Whole Lives, Taking Flight. They are a resource of ministers, scientists, authors, and psychologists addressing topics that will help families navigate conversations on sexuality and spirituality.

Have you ever wondered:
What is my grandchild learning
about spirituality and sexuality?
How can I answer my child's
questions about his or her body?
How can I assure that my child or
grandchild can talk to me about
matters of intimacy?
What are the barriers that LGBTQ+
people face?


Confirmation Class

From the Historian's Desk



When the residents of northern Groton began to agitate for a society of their own in 1724, so quickly after the formation of their town, Groton, and its church, they were probably aware of similar moves throughout the region. Eastern Connecticut in particular was constantly producing new government-approved churches (which generally led to Congregational churches) during the first half of the 1700s.

While there had been several such churches founded as early as the mid-1600s, they were usually along navigable waters, like the coastline or sizeable rivers (think Hartford, Windsor, Wethersfield, New Haven, Old Saybrook, Guilford, Norwich and New London). As settlers moved farther inland, and small communities grew large enough to support a local church, the ecclesiastical landscape was rapidly changing early in the next century.

I remembered that my childhood church, a little north of Norwich in Scotland, Connecticut, was founded around the same time as ours, so I looked up the details. The story was remarkably similar, even though they were not near a river the size of

the Thames. The town of Windham was set off in 1692 and immediately hired a pastor, Samuel Whiting, although the church there was not considered officially organized until 1700, when Rev. Whiting was finally ordained. Already settlers were arriving in the eastern portion of the new town and by 1731, they appealed to the General Assembly for separate society privileges. Windham was no happier to lose part of their tax base than Groton had been six years earlier, and they objected, but permission for Scotland Society was granted at the May 1732 assembly. They met at first at a private home, that of Nathaniel Huntington (with toddler Samuel, future signer of the Declaration of Independence, Governor of Connecticut, and first "President of the United States of America in Congress Assembled," probably running around underfoot). A site in approximately the center of the society was chosen for a meetinghouse, on a lot provided by Mr. Huntington, and several potential ministers later, a permanent pastor was secured in 1735, Rev. Ebenezer Devotion, Jr., recently graduated from Yale, who stayed for the remainder of his life. Doesn't the pattern sound familiar?

It turns out many churches in this part of the state began between about 1710 and 1745, just one generation. I did a rough count from the sketches in "Contributions

to the Ecclesiastical History of Connecticut," published in 1861, and found about twenty-three new churches just in that period (1710-45) in southeastern Connecticut – some as new societies branching off as we did, some established along with new towns. There are many more nearby. We were in good company!

If you would like to browse some articles about early Connecticut Congregationalism, written from the perspective of the time, see the two -volume set in the history section of our Holdridge Library. Volume 1 was published in 1861 by the "General Association," and the second volume in 1967 by what had become the UCC Connecticut Conference.

Small Group Circle Ministry

The groups will commence in August and meet once a month. Participants are asked to make a six month commitment and then have the option to commit for a second six month period. The purpose of the groups is to foster fellowship and have a safe place to talk about life and faith. If you signed up, you will be assigned to a group.

What is an AED and Where is it in Our Church?

AED stands for Automated External Defibrillator and ours is currently located in the hallway connecting Social Hall to the office area. It is on the wall across from the Women's bathroom.

Why do we need this?

AEDs are used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. It is a sophisticated, yet easy to use medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm. The device has clear audio instructions guiding the user through each step of the process.

Sudden cardiac arrest is among the leading causes of death in the United States. In fact, more than 350,000 people will suffer cardiac arrest this year. The American Heart Association estimates that expanding access to AEDs could potentially save 50,000 lives each year. Currently, the only way to restore a regular heart rhythm during cardiac arrest is to use an AED.

How do we know when someone is in sudden cardiac arrest? Signs that someone may be in

Signs that someone may be in sudden cardiac arrest include

sudden collapse, unresponsiveness, and lack of normal breathing. The person may appear unconscious and not respond to verbal or physical stimuli. They may also have experienced dizziness, lightheadedness, extreme fatigue, weakness, nausea, or vomiting.

Summary

In an emergency always call 911 first. In the case of cardiac arrest begin CPR while someone else runs for the AED. For each minute defibrillation is delayed, the odds of survival are reduced by approximately 10%, so having access to an AED is critical.




We invite you to become a part of Ledyard history by attending the reenactment of the *Bill Dinner*, an annual event throughout much of our history.
