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A Message From Pastor Pat

The Hardest Part

Hurt We Carry,

Hope We Find

Our Lenten walk begins on March 5th with an Ash Wednesday service at 7:00 in the evening. In this gentle, meditative service we are reminded of our mortality with the simple words, "You are dust and to dust you will return." Beyond a reminder of our mortality, we are also reminded of our shared humanity. We are all of the same substance. Life is breathed into us by our Creator so that we might embody life to one another.

At Christmas we are reminded of God's coming to share the human experience in the Incarnation of Jesus. In this profound act of love and solidarity, we are reminded that God's spirit is breathed into us so that we might embody Christ to one another.

Yet we know that the stuff of life gets in the way. We disappoint each other, we hurt each other, our relationships get broken (sometimes in ways that baffle us). Being human is no easy thing, yet it is the very

essence of life lived in this mortal Christlike body.

Join us this Lenten season as we explore "The Hardest Part, hurt we carry, hope we find." Beginning on Ash Wednesday we will explore being human. Each Sunday we will explore a different part of this tender and terrible thing we call life; and in the midst of it all we will discover the unique hope that is ours as people of faith.

I hope you will join us on Sundays for worship AND for the Lenten Study group which will meet at 8:30 a.m. in the Holdridge Library. These sessions will give us an opportunity to dig a little deeper and more personally into each aspect of the life that is ours and the life we share.

This is an important and timely study as we enter the healing process in our Peace and Reconciliation Process. Many have strained relationships with long-standing friends and neighbors within the church. Some have

relationships that have been completely severed by disagreement or being on different sides of a conflict or an issue. The stuff of life has gotten in the way. Paul reminds us in his letter to the Corinthians that when "one suffers, the whole body suffers" (1 Corithians 12:26). Coming together to explore the hurts we carry we will discover the hope that is ours. It is the foundation of becoming a healthy vital church that will be ready to welcome new leadership in the fullness of time.

As I have said and written many times, you do not need to be a member to participate. And, you do not need to have a specific issue with a specific person. There is tremendous power in bearing witness to our sisters and brothers in Christ creating space for the Spirit to bring reconciliation. I cannot encourage you strongly enough to be part of this process. Even if you have not been able to participate in previous sessions, I encourage you to come and be a part of this healing and empowering process. Our next Peace and Reconciliation Meeting is on March 15th from 9:30-2:30. Signup sheets are on the bulletin board between the offices.



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From the Historian's Desk



Getting to know our history

I thought I'd provide some of the backstory to the establishment of our ecclesiastical society in October 1725, so you will understand the context of the event. How did we get to that point?

As many of you know, Groton
Congregational Church is our
"mother" church, and the First
Congregational Church of New
London is our "grandmother"
church. The path led through these
congregations over about three
quarters of a century to the request
for our own church.

Originally, of course, the area was inhabited by several Native American tribes, including the Pequots, Mohegans and others. In the 1640s, shortly after the end of the Pequot War, John Winthrop, Jr., the adventurous son of the governor of Massachusetts, took an interest in the area. As a trained scientist with an interest in minerals, he obtained in 1640 a grant of land at "Pequod" for iron works, and he quickly moved to settle the area with English. Pequod refers to the area around the mouth of what we now call the Thames River, Winthrop

managed to work with the native Americans still in the area, and relations were generally peaceful.

In 1650, Rev. Richard Blinman arrived in the new settlement being formed by Winthrop. Rev. Blinman brought with him most of his congregation from Gloucester, Massachusetts, and they established a church on the hillside on the west bank of the river. Over the next fifty years the settlement spread north and across the river to the east. The river was a major source of transportation, but it was also an impediment for those residents on the east side to get to church and do business in town. Soon they sought permission to hold services on the east side of the river, and it was not long before they were given permission from the General Assembly to incorporate as a separate town.

Groton, established in 1704/5, and named after Winthrop's hometown

in England, was laid out as a large town, especially long from north to south, with considerable distance from the north border with Preston to the coast. There had long been settlers in the northern part of Groton, as families like Robert Allyn's went up the river to settle (Allyn's Point). By 1725, several families had lived in North Groton for substantial time, including people with names like Geer, Williams, Spicer, Bill, Avery, Lester and Morgan.

Very quickly, those in the north, nearer Preston, began to complain that it was unreasonably far to travel to church in Groton, especially in light of the poor condition of the roads in those early days. Transportation played a major part in justifying the repeated requests to separate.

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Faith Formation and Sunday School



It's been a busy time in Sunday School with many fun opportunities for hands-on learning. We have focused on the theme that God Is Love. Love to a child manifests in so many different ways. We learned from the children that we experience love when we see a friend we know but haven't seen for a while, when we get hugs when we are hurt or not feeling well, when we cuddle on the couch with parents and siblings to enjoy a book or movie, when we dance to good music. We share love when we help do the dishes, or stand up for a friend if they have fallen or had their feelings hurt. The topic of love is huge, and includes the welcome we feel when we are at church.

We are also exploring Love as a means of caring for the environment. To that end, we enjoyed learning more about recycling as we sorted and weighed the plastic caps that we are collecting for our Rainbow Bench Project. To date, we have approximately 17 lbs. of plastic caps, with a minimum goal of collecting 200 lbs. Our children are seeing, first hand, the quick accumulation of plastic, and the need to have effective recycling. Luca has taken on the role of the Sunday School

spokesperson for the project, and after our first sorting and weighing event he said, "We have about 17 pounds of plastic. We are on our way to 200 for the bench! The most important part of the sorting is that we learned more about what can be used and what can't be used. Let's keep collecting, everyone!!" Luca's voice is infectious, and as we work with Missions, and with all of your help, we can achieve what the children tell us is a very big goal!

Going forward, as we move into spring, the children will begin planning for this year's garden. This is another opportunity for hands-on learning as we plant seeds, watch them sprout and care for them until they are ready to be planted outdoors. All of this active learning is a way of showing that even children, or perhaps especially children, are spreading God's love on earth.

The next Faith Formation Meeting is Wednesday, February 12th at 12 noon.



The Connection offers nationally recognized child welfare-focused programs that help families provide stable, loving homes for all children.

Coley House, located in Bridgeport, Hallie House, located in Middletown, and Hogan House located in Hartford are, according to their website, "residential stepdown program where pregnant and/or parenting women are required to participate in community-based substance use treatment while living in a safe and structured environment. Clients meet with their Case Manager on a weekly basis and attend daily psychoeducational groups. The program is designed to support women as they return to their communities as a healthy and productive parent in recovery". Back in 2020, the director of Mother's Retreat, a predecessor of the Coley, Hallie, and Hogan House programs, came and spoke about that program. We are excited to hear about these new programs and all they offer to help reunite and stabilize families after "difficult life challenges such as trauma, substance use, struggles with behavioral health, or homelessness". We hope you will be able to join us.

We are making plans to hold a bake sale during the Ledyard Garden's Annual Plant Sale on Saturday, May


17th. We were able to resume this activity last year after a few years off and despite a raining day, made a profit of \$1,076.25! More details

Wells for South Sudan Update

Last year, Gabriela taught us all about the importance of providing fresh drinking water to the people of South Sudan. When Gabriela first introduced the Sunday School students to this need, she told us that rather than go to school, young girls were sent to collect water to bring back to their homes. Not only did they miss getting their education, but the water wasn't always safe to drink, and many people suffered from drinking it. Gabriela met with LCC Missions Committee members to ask for their support, organized her friends to raise money at a Pancake Breakfast, and even made a presentation to the local Rotary Club. Gabriela submitted the funds that she raised

under the name, Team Ledyard.

This week, after learning that many non-profit organizations lost their funding, forcing the shutdown of electrical supply to some of the wells in South Sudan, we reached out to Wells for South Sudan for an update. Wells for South Sudan is based in Rochester and doesn't rely on government funds. Their projects are still on schedule. However, many of the refugee camps, medical clinics, food programs, and some other well projects completely lost their funding. UNICEF was among the organizations that were affected.

While the Team Ledyard well is still on target to be built soon (well #3 is

being built now, and Team Ledyard is #5), Wells For South



Sudan is looking to expand its reach. They are partnering with another nonprofit, Transform South Sudan, which operates the only health clinic within a 100-mile radius, treating many water borne illnesses. The goal is to drill an additional ten wells in the rural areas surrounding the clinic. Their fundraising efforts will begin sometime in March.

Gabriela's interest in South Sudan brings us all closer to the people in that region. As a congregation, in supporting Gabriela's goal, we made a huge difference in the lives of others.
