The Prostate Cancer Support Group is now meeting at John and Donna Clark's home.



KEYPAD DOOR LOCKS

How do I enter the building through a new keypad lock?

- Just enter the same 4-digit PIN used with the alarm system.
- You can also enter by waving a keyring FOB or wallet size card in front of the lock. Ask Rob Burns to assign one of these to you.

Why does alarm panel still beep when I enter?

 The lock system and the alarm system are independent from one another, so you may still need to disarm the alarm system at the panel or by using the Total Connect app on your smart phone.

ALARM SYSTEM

When I enter the building, why does the alarm panel near the entry door beep at me?

 Beeping at the panel warns you the partition you entered is armed.
 You have 60 seconds to disarm at the alarm panel before the alarm siren is triggered.

What is a partition?

- There are 3 sections (or partitions) of the church. Each partition has a control panel associated with it, located near keypad entry doors.
 - P1 Office area (including Music Room)
 - * P2 Fellowship Hall

(including Lester Room)

 P3 - Sanctuary (including Social Hall)

When I re-arm the partition, why does the alarm panel again beep?

 Beeping now warns you the partition is armed. You have 60 seconds to exit. Opening the exit door after that will again trigger the alarm (after 60 seconds).

What's the difference between arming "away" and arming "stay"?

 Arming away activates motion sensors as well as entry/exit doors, while arming stay excludes motion sensors. Stay mode is especially useful when you plan to be in the church alone for an extended period. Any visitor through an entry door will still need to disarm the system to prevent the siren from being triggered.

Why is the siren immediately activated when I enter another partition through an interior door?

 If you enter an armed partition from an interior door, active motion sensors will immediately trigger the alarm siren.

Can I disarm multiple partitions from a single panel? YES

 You can arm or disarm multiple partitions from a single panel by entering the associated partition number(s). For example, to disarm partitions 1 and 2 simultaneously at the panel, enter your 4-digit PIN, then 1 (for OFF), then 12 (for both partitions), then press the star key (*).

Is there an easier way?

- An easier way to arm/disarm is by using the Total Connect app on your smart phone. If you haven't added this to your phone, ask Rob Burns to help set you up.
- Also note these Panel operation shortcuts:
 - # 2 (arm away single partition no PIN needed)
 - * # 3 (arm stay single partition no PIN needed)
 - * [PIN] 2-0 * (arm away ALL partition)
 - * [PIN] 1 0 * (disarm ALL partitions)





BEING CONGREGATIONAL

- The congregation is the final seat of authority on four issues:
 - Property
 - Leadership
 - * Doctrine
 - Money
- The congregation owns the real estate
- The congregation chooses its own leaders
- The congregation sets its own doctrine
- The congregation handles its own financial affairs
- The church is administered by leaders elected by the congregation
- Staff are empowered with authority as delineated in job descriptions
- Christ is the ultimate head of the church
- The church covenants with the denomination to share resources and support ministries beyond the local church
- Covenants with the local association to cooperate in matters of search and call, ministerial standing and interchurch cooperation

Our Whole Lives is a sexual educational program that spans Kindergarten through adult, with some special attention to older adults, the differently able, people of all gender identities, people in crisis, and the very young. 

From the Historian's Desk



We have no records to tell us what the residents of North Groton were doing in November (or December) of 1725, but it seems likely they were talking about how to set up their new society, where to place the meetinghouse and where to meet until it could be built. Volunteers to host Sunday services would need to be able to accommodate a large gathering, one that would stay all day, because there were usually long morning AND afternoon services in those days.

In the meantime, cold weather was setting in and food for the winter needed to be stored. Fortunately for us, Joshua Hempstead of New London was keeping a detailed daily diary, which can give us a flavor of what must have been going on. While he was involved in more facets of town life than most, he was getting in wood, slaughtering livestock, gathering animals in from their summer pastures, and travelling to numerous locations in the process. He went by foot, by horseback and sometimes by boat across the river or along the coast to Stonington.

Hempstead's writing was often abbreviated, and he noted almost every Sunday "Mr ad. pr. al d." Mr. Adams was the pastor in New London at the time and, like other preachers, preached all day. Friday, November 5, was stormy, with rain, hail and snow, so Joshua stayed at home mending a wheel. On the eighth, he went to Norwich alone in his whaleboat, transporting some goods for people and doing some business, then stayed overnight. He came back the next day, staying overnight at Ralph Stoddard's on the way.

During the services on Sunday November 14, a collection was taken for a Canterbury woman "tht had 3 Children at a Birth & all Living." Babies were baptized, young couples "published," making public their plan to marry, and deaths were noted. During the month of November Joshua unloaded salt hay, fenced hay stacks and the cow yard, slaughtered a calf, two sows and two hogs, brought in three loads of walnut, and worked on the highway. He purchased from a Mr. Hartshorn ten pairs of [blank] gravestones of various sizes, some of which he carved in early December for specific clients. He agreed to pay in wool (100 pounds). Families in North Groton were probably engaged in similar activities. Many would spend a lot of time farming, and individuals often had some kind

of special skill they could use to barter for goods like Joshua did with his gravestones.

Much of that month was apparently fair weather, with just a few days of rain or mist, but Friday the 26th was cloudy and snowy and the next day he estimated three inches of snow. Winter was coming.

So, Tell me Again How I log into Zoom to Join the Sunday Service?

Every week, in the email blast, below the first slide that invites you to "Join us for Worship" is a button that says "Click here for zoom meeting information and dial in **numbers".** If you choose to join us online, click here and follow the instructions. It's easy.

If you have tried this in the recent past and it hasn't worked, you are not crazy. We discovered that the link to zoom hasn't been working consistently and we want you to know that it's fixed. If you experience any problems with this link, please let us know by emailing the church office.


What they need are **Warm Wool Blankets!** Our Missions Committee will be collecting blankets during November....and even longer if necessary. Here's how you can help:
