FAQs update #2 on our new keypad lock and alarm systems

KEYPAD DOOR LOCKS

How do I enter the building through a new keypad lock?

- Just enter the same 4-digit PIN used with the alarm system.
- You can also enter by waving a keyring FOB or wallet size card in front of the lock. Ask Rob Burns to assign one of these to you.

Why does alarm panel still beep when I enter?

 The lock system and the alarm system are independent from one another, so you may still need to disarm the alarm system at the panel or by using the Total Connect app on your smart phone.

ALARM SYSTEM

When I enter the building, why does the alarm panel near the entry door beep at me?

- Beeping at the panel warns you the partition you entered is armed.
 You have 60 seconds to disarm at the alarm panel before the alarm siren is triggered.
- NOTE: The alarm panel inside the social hall door reflects the status of the upper sanctuary partition #3 only, and NOT social hall. Social Hall is part of partition #1 and its status is reflected on the alarm panel inside the office foyer entry door.

When I re-arm the partition, why

does the alarm panel again beep?

 Beeping now warns you the partition is armed. You have 60 seconds to exit. Opening the exit door after that will again trigger the alarm (after 60 seconds).

What's the difference between arming "away" and arming "stay"?

 Arming away activates motion sensors as well as entry/exit doors, while arming stay excludes motion sensors. Stay mode is especially useful when you plan to be in the church alone for an extended period. Any visitor through an entry door will still need to disarm the system to prevent the siren from being triggered.

Why is the siren immediately activated when I enter another partition through an interior door?

 If you enter an armed partition from an interior door, active motion sensors will immediately trigger the alarm siren.

Can I disarm multiple partitions from a single panel?

You can arm or disarm multiple
 (or all) partitions from a single
 panel by entering the associated
 partition number(s). For example,
 to disarm partitions 1 and 2
 simultaneously at the panel, enter
 your 4-digit PIN, then 1 (for OFF),
 then 12 (for both partitions), then
 press the star key (*).

Is there an easier way?

 An easier way to arm/disarm is by using the Total Connect app on your smart phone. If you haven't

- added this to your phone, ask Rob Burns to help set you up.
- Also note these Panel operation shortcuts:
 - * # 2 (arm away single partition no PIN needed)
 - # 3 (arm stay single partition no PIN needed)
 - * [PIN] 1 1 * (disarm partition 1-Office area and Social Hall)
 - * [PIN] 1 2 * (disarm partition 2— Fellowship Hall and Lester Room)
 - * [PIN] 1 3 * (disarm partition 3— Sanctuary)
 - * [PIN] 1 0 * (disarm ALL partitions)

Ledyard Congregational Church Fire Drill Instructions Sanctuary

If the Fire Warning Alarm Sounds

Remain calm.
Immediately initiate evacuation
procedures.

Do not use the chair lift.

- Proceed to the ground level and outdoors.
 - If sitting by a window, please close it.
 - If you are able, please assist those with mobility challenges, children, as well as any guests in your area.
 - Those with mobility challenges are encouraged to exit the back of the church through the double doors in the Narthex.
 - Those sitting in the <u>front half</u>
 of the church will exit the front
 of the church via the fire
 escape.
 - Those sitting in the <u>back half of</u> <u>the church</u> will exit the back of the church through the <u>double</u> doors in the Narthex.
 - If children are in Sunday
 School, they will exit with their teachers to the Pole Barn.
 - All walk to the Pole Barn (if possible) ~ the designated assembly area.

- Wait at the designated assembly area until you hear the sound of 3 blasts from an air horn, indicating that it's clear to return to the building. Note: the Pole Barn is our meeting point in the event of separation from family members.
- If you encounter smoke, take short breaths through your nose and crawl along the floor to the nearest exit.
- Feel all doors with your hand before opening. If the door is hot, do not open it. If the door is cool, open it slowly, keeping behind the door in case you have to quickly close it to protect yourself from oncoming smoke or fire.

Do not

- go to your automobile or attempt to move it from the parking lot. This could hinder access by emergency vehicles.
- congregate near building exits, driveways, or roadways.
- return for coats, purses, briefcases, etc., after leaving the area.
- reenter the building until an all-clear is issued.
- <u>Do</u> give feedback about positives and areas of concern to the Safe Church Committee.

Keep Those Caps and Lids Coming For our Rainbow Bench!



Here are the answers to a few frequently asked questions.

Q: Are the covers on my fast food drinks from McDonald's acceptable? A: **Yes!** a fast food drink cover is acceptable, but **only** if it has a 2, 4 or 5 "PP" code on it. Solo cup covers ARE NOT ACCEPTABLE! Make sure covers are washed and clean.

Q: My lid has a paper disk on the inside of the lid.

A: The paper disk <u>MUST</u> be removed, which is easy to do.

Q. I have a white pill bottle from over-the-counter vitamins which is labeled 1.

A: **No,** that is not acceptable.

Prescription pill bottles are acceptable, but they MUST have a 2, 4 or 5 recycle code on it. The caps from these bottles are also acceptable.

While we don't currently have an Our Whole Lives curriculum available at LCC, there is an online resource that can guide us through the many questions we may have about the intersection of spirituality and sexuality. The United Church of Christ and the Unitarian Universalists have collaborated to recorded a collection of webinar videos addressing many aspects of human sexuality from infancy through adulthood. From the Historian's Desk



Three Hundred Years!

We're finally there! It's been three hundred years since the Connecticut colonial General Assembly, at its October 1725 session, granted the northern part of Groton rights as a separate society, making possible what became the Town of Ledyard and our Congregational Church. Captain Morgan and his neighbors had persevered, despite push-back from the town's southern residents, and followed the regulations of the times to obtain their goal of having a church closer to home.

During the October 1725 meeting of the General Assembly, Capt. Peirce, Capt. Noyes, and Mr. Bacchus, the committee that had come out to research the situation in the northern part of Groton, made its report. The evidence they produced included a three page list of the households involved, with approximate distances north from the meetinghouse in Groton and the value of their estate, in pounds, shillings and pence. There were 24 heads of households living about 8

or 9 miles away, 22 about 6 or 7 miles north, and 33 living 3-5 miles north of the meetinghouse. That's 79 families of various sizes, with a total value in estates of 4191 pounds, 15 shillings, 6 pence.

An additional 21 who lived 2-3 miles away were listed and totaled separately. Perhaps there was some thought that they would be remaining in the south society, although they were referenced as being in the "north train band." (This sounds as though the town was already roughly divided for the purposes of militia training.)

Because the report is really the heart of the anniversary being celebrated, I will include it in its entirety.

The committee report, dated September 28, 1725, stated:

Whereas the General Assembly in May last did, upon the petition of Capt. John Morgan and the rest of the petitioners of the north end of Groton, moving to be a society and to set up the worship of God amongst them, appoint us the subscribers to take a view of said town and to inform ourselves as well as we could of its circumstances, and whether they are sufficient for the support of two ministers among them: We have therefore, pursuant to our orders,

been and taken a survey of said place, and from the best knowledge we could gain, (both by our own observation and their information,) we are of the opinion that they are of estates sufficient for the ends proposed by the petitioners; and further, having heard the argument on both sides respecting a dividing line between them, it is our judgement that said line ought to begin at a monument to be erected at the extent of a line drawn from Groton meeting house due north, one mile and twenty rods, and the dividing line to begin at said monument and to run west and by north to the great river on the west, and from said monument to run east and by south to the extent of the east bounds of said town; which lines shall divide between the south and north society. Dated in Groton the 28th day of September, Anno Dom. 1725.

The record simply notes that "the above read, approved and accepted by this Assembly and ordered to be recorded."

Public Records of the Colony of Connecticut, v. 6, p. 557, as published.

North Groton was now free to begin planning how to find a minster, where to meet while they built a meeting house, where to post notice of meetings, etc. They had experience as part of running a

church at Groton, and some perhaps had been there at the setting aside of Groton itself, only twenty years earlier. Now they were on their own!



CPR, First Aid and use of AED Below you will find an

article about Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) which was printed in an earlier issue of the Chatter.

As an update:

The Safety Team discussed the possibility of purchasing another AED so that we would have one on each floor. At this point, we decided to stay with one and make our next step the scheduling of another CPR/First Aid/AED workshop. Several members of our church participated in a CPR class about a year ago.

If you would be interested in attending such a class, please let Sue Burns or Beth Smith know.

What is an AED and where is it in our church?

AED stands for Automated External Defibrillator and ours is currently located in the hallway connecting Social Hall to the office area. It is on the wall across from the Women's bathroom.

Why do we need this?

AEDs are used to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. It is a sophisticated, yet easy to use medical device that can analyze the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, deliver an electrical shock to help the heart re-establish an effective rhythm. The device has clear audio

instructions guiding the user through each step of the process.

Sudden cardiac arrest is among the leading causes of death in the United States. In fact, more than 350,000 people will suffer cardiac arrest this year. The American Heart Association estimates that expanding access to AEDs could potentially save 50,000 lives each year. Currently, the only way to restore a regular heart rhythm during cardiac arrest is to use an AED.

How do we know when someone is in sudden cardiac arrest?

Signs that someone may be in sudden cardiac arrest include sudden collapse, unresponsiveness, and lack of normal breathing. The person may appear unconscious and not respond to verbal or physical stimuli. They may also have experienced dizziness, lightheadedness, extreme fatigue, weakness, nausea, or vomiting.

Summary

In an emergency always call 911 first. In the case of cardiac arrest begin CPR while someone else runs for the AED. For each minute defibrillation is delayed, the odds of survival are reduced by approximately 10%, so having access to an AED is critical.


